Students returned to school with sheer excitement and a curious yet positive attitude to learn. Orientation included administering COVID tests to all students, measuring students for new uniforms, and several activities focused on the School's expectations, rules, core values and team building

Furthermore, to enable our teachers to meet requirements, share best practices, and to equip and support them with the opportunity of growth in their teaching career, the school also hosted staff to eight days of Professional Development prior to the start of the school year, with intentions of follow-up sessions throughout the year. Presentations were met with enthusiasm and participation was high as teachers were engaged during sessions.

Our student body comes from an impoverished and overly challenged life. Our primary campus has expanded, and this year we will celebrate our first high school graduation from our 12<sup>th</sup> Graders. These students are the pioneers of the School of St.

Yared and have set a great example for others to follow. We tip out hats to them and their great



accomplishment, with warm wishes and expectations of the greatness that will follow.

I look forward to providing you with regular updates on the progress of these initiatives, the students and The School of St Yared in the months ahead.

### 2020/2021 End of Year Wrap-up

The School of St. Yared ended the 2020/21 Academic Year with several activities to wrap up our year. In June 2021, an all-inclusive Staff Reflection was held at the Mongolia Hotel, with around 38 employees in attendance, with a final focus on preparing for the next academic year.

The program entailed identifying major gaps last year and future plans of the School. Points raised included academic setbacks caused by the onslaught of the COVID 19 pandemic, possible improvements in teaching methodologies and time management, staff fulfillment of duties and effects of a late start to the school year, and the effectiveness of reporting. The program also featured the introduction of Teachers' Individual Learning Plan (ILP) and Performance Improvement Plan (PIP) by Human Resources, forming a strong basis to teachers' yearly appraisals.

Also, teachers were directed to observe and consider students' results, effort, skills, and overall social and behavioral development and attitudes towards learning. Moreover, a

schedule was created to facilitate and ensure timely preparation of students' letters to sponsors.

Additionally, a close follow-up was conducted in the performance of the School of St. Yared High School students with the intention of rewarding individuals who have exhibited academic achievement.

As the year came to a close, to promote and foster a sense of community, the School of St. Yared hosted its Annual Parent Day, with all members of staff, students, and families present. It was a memorable and joyous event, with various performances, such as a Class Drama in Amharic, a cultural dance and poem recitals, culminating in an Awards Ceremony for our Grades 2-11 Student Body.

Despite obstacles faced, we have ended the year on a promising note and eagerly look ahead to the next academic year with optimism and in anticipation of a successful journey!

### **COVID-19 Update From Yared Wolde**

Last year, The School of St. Yared experienced several hitches due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Activities that failed to facilitate social distancing were halted, such as the flag ceremony during Morning Assembly and interschool sports meets. There was also an academic impact because of the delayed start to the school year.

In August 2021, the Ministry of Education mandated that all teachers returning to their workplace be vaccinated against COVID-19. All staff members attended an awareness program at the local health centre, focusing on advantages and possible effects of being vaccinated. In collaborating with the health centre, 32 members of staff were vaccinated before the start of the teaching year, in accordance with the MoEs guidelines.



As this school year commenced, on the first day of school, 150 students were initially tested for COVID-19. The remaining students were taken by the School Nurse to a nearby



local health centre for testing upon their return. By the end of the week, our entire student body was tested, totaling 163 students. Students' temperatures are checked daily and handsanitizer used upon entry on campus.

Unfortunately, one student, Hiwot Berhanu in Grade 7, tested positive and was immediately quarantined before being collected from the school by her parents. As a result, Hiwot was absent for two weeks. In which time, her family members were also tested – an initiative undertaken by the School Nurse. Before returning to school, Hiwot was tested again, and the results being negative, she was allowed to attend school.

We will continue with the temperature and sanitizer routines to ensure our campus remains safe. At the beginning of December 2021 all students and staff are COVID-19 free.

family lives is on the outskirts of Addis and 22km away from the St Yared school.

Her father is a daily

labourer in a private house construction. The house will be finished soon and so he must look for another job. He doesn't have any skills or education so the only work he can do is as a daily labourer or being a compound guard.

Tsega's mother is working in a local school as a cleaner.
