Great results from AcceleratED



After a summer break St Yareds students are back and working very hard already. Recently, Grades 1, 2 and 3 had their learning efforts tested by AcceleratED, a social enterprise that partners with school leaders and teachers to make learning fun and effective in classrooms across Ethiopia. The results and proficiency levels in fundamental skills in Mathematics and English were then compared to other Ethiopian schools, both government and private. Our students performed very well, there was significant progress from Grade 1 to Grade 2. Our Grade 1 students' performance was average, which was expected since our students come from very disadvantaged background. Thanks to St Yared's teachers efforts and the hard work of our kids, Grade 2 students outperformed other schools. Our Grade 3 was the best in Maths out of all schools tested. We are very proud of our students so far! Let's see how the other Grades will perform in upcoming months.
